Birthdays & **Hire Dates** The Times, they are a'changin'. And by that we mean The New York Times, which I think is a newspaper or something. Anyone out there ever heard of it?

The change is that MLS is now The Times' BFF. It must be so because we are getting an online subscription to the venerable "Gray Lady" of American journalism to add to our newspaper databases—and we will be the only public library that has one. The. Only. One.

The Times is considered the non plus ultra of American newspapers. Founded in 1851, it has won an astonishing 108 Pulitzer Prizes. The online version receives more than 30 million unique visitors every month. The paper's motto is "All the News That's Fit to Print"—online it's "All the News That's Fit to Click."

Susan Ryan, Mat Sel, hopes that our subscription will begin during the first week of October, but as of this writing there are still a few details to be ironed out. She has her fingers crossed. Stay tuned.

The Genres, They're Changing-too

We came across an online article recently that might be of interest to anyone who follows YA literature, fiction for a primarily female audience, book marketing trends, or changes in genre fiction. It's called "Is Young Adult Fiction the New Chick Lit?"

Writer Anna North points out that more than a few writers of traditional chick lit are making a switch to YA. She singles out Emma McLaughlin and Nicola Kraus (The Nanny Diaries) whose second novel is "about a 17-year-old girl named Max's first experience with heartbreak. Kraus says that her youth gives the story more urgency. She and McLaughlin hoped to address a basic question about a very first breakup: 'how do you know that you're going to live through it if you haven't before?' Kraus explains that part of the appeal of young adult fiction is being able to 'watch someone go through something for the first time."

Even Candace Bushnell, author of Sex and the City, is moving into YA, and Jessica Brody (The Fidelity Files) had trouble selling her second book, The Karma Club, until she rewrote the main female characters, changing them from adults to teens.

Southern Oaks Up and Running

The Southern Oaks Library, established in 1975, stands out prominently against a background of trees & small creek just ¼ mile north of I-240.

The library now features nearly 1,878 in new square footage and 1,593 in reclaimed square footage (from the previously existing garage) for a total addition of nearly 3,500 square feet.

At 20,164 square feet, the library is the 4th largest library by area in the MLS.

Granted, They Are Our Friends.

Friends of the Library grants have been lifesavers for library's needing additional funding for special programs. They still are, but according to MLS Director of Development **Diane** Sarantakos, the procedure for applying for FOL grants has changed.

"In the past," she said, "staff and libraries would request funds from the Friends prior to the budget input cycle. Along with trying to determine the needs at a library for the upcoming year, we were asking that you also try to identify special projects that might be appropriate to ask for the Friends to fund."

The potential problem was that the ideas for these projects don't always come along during the window of opportunity for applying, so changes needed to be made that would allow applications to be submitted all year long.

The new process will work this way:

- 1. Manager or other staff member contacts Diane Sarantakos (ex. 3761) to discuss the special project or funding need
- 2. All projects must be aligned with the Friends' giving preferences, and the Director of Development will make that determination
 - a. A discussion with Library Operations will help determine whether or not this project can be pursued at this time
 - b. If yes, the Manager will submit a 2-3 para graph outline of the project and the amount of monies being requested. This will then be submitted to the Friends Board of Directors at their monthly meeting for consideration and vote
 - c. If no, Diane will contact the requesting staff members and Manager to discuss why this is not a request that can be considered at this time
- 3. The written portion of the request must be submitted by the second Monday of the month to be included in the Board packets
- 4. The library or department Manager must approve the request before it will be considered


Lending Library: Early Literacy **Programming En** Español: Mother Goose On the Loose: Programs for **Bilingual Learners**

Diamont-Cohen is the creator of the Mother Goose on the Loose concept currently in use at several MLS libraries. In this book, supporting the program, she uses a combination of translated MGOL songs and traditional Spanish songs from around the world, this lively program helps children develop school readiness skills and presents child development tips to the adults in their lives. The book is loaded with lyrics, rhymes, activities, developmental tips, program aids, set-up instructions, worksheets, and bibliographies in both English and Spanish."

Booklist calls it an "informative book [that] will help librarians plan and implement bilingual storytimes. All of the lyrics, activities, and scripts have Spanish translations alongside the English. Resources include a CD-ROM with audio of the songs and rhymes and reproducible documents found in the book. The most helpful information covers how to work within the Latino community; how to plan and present with a Spanish-speaking partner; and how to customize the book's programs to suit the individual library."

If you're Spanish-speaking customer base is growing and you want to learn more about the Mother Goose on the Loose program, this is a good place to start.

Building a Reading City: Keep It Short, vol. 2

Last month we asked staff to send us the titles of their favorite short stories and we received more responses than we had room to run, so this month we'll use this space to complete the list. Once again, our staff's taste in short fiction runs the gamut from everyday realism to dark fantasy, from the familiar to the forgotten.

Thanks to everyone who submitted a title and author.

Susan Beckett (WA): wanted to tell us about *Joust* by Mercedes Lackey, from the book *The Dragon Quin-tet*. "It's a story about a slave boy trained to care for dragons and his quest for independence becomes real when he hatches a dragon's egg. I enjoyed the story because you get a feel for the boy's life and how his life changes as he interacts with the dragons, eventually gaining his freedom."

Daniel Fields (BE): Daniel introduces us to *Naftali the Storyteller and His Horse Sus* by Isaac Bashevis Singer, "the story of a boy who 'loved stories too much' and the life his love of stories led him to live. It's a story of a life well lived and an inspiration to pursue the passions that mean the most to us. The story can be found in *Stories for Children* by Isaac Bashevis Singer, found only at the Downtown Library."

Tom Ballagher (DN): Tom wrote that a short story he enjoyed was *An Alpine Divorce* by Robert Barr. "A couple, each who hates the other very intensely, plot to kill the other. The saying that hell knowth no fury







like that of a woman scorned applies here. This was included in a collection entitled *Murder Most Foul*, *Volume One*."

Sally McCurry (DC): Sally is a woman after my own heart with her recommendation of *The Graveyard Rats* by Henry Kuttner. "It's the perfect horror story: rats and claustrophobia and a groundskeeper who gets what he deserves (and maybe a little more)."

Luisa Matthynssens (ED): Luisa likes F. Scott Fitzgerald's *Head and Shoulders*, about "a young genius and a dancer who challenges his intellectual life that is void of fun. They go on to get married and their roles of brains v. body are reversed."

Finally, **Robin Sagel** (MC) Robin reminds us of a pair of everyone's favorites. "There are several I like, but one I've always been fond of was *The Lady or the Tiger*? by Frank Stockton. It's about the king's daughter and a young man falling in love, and the king sending the suitor into the arena to choose one of two doors and meet his fate. It's a real 'cliffhanger' and thus its dear place in my heart. And of course, if you want to discuss Christmas stories, who can beat *The Gift of the Magi*, by O. Henry? I think most people know that one, so I won't give a synopsis. I do love a heroic tearjerker!"
