


They'll Do It Every Time Dept.


The customer read the sign incorrectly as saying For Biden and was angered at the library for displaying such a blatantly partisan political poster.

Lending Library: *Reference Reborn: Breathing New Life Into Public Services Librarianship*

Editor Diane Zabel, the Louis and Virginia Benzak Business Librarian at the Schreyer Business Library, Penn State University, and one-time president of the Reference and User Services Association (RUSA), a division of ALA, has put together an anthology of over two dozen essays on developments and trends in reference and public services librarianship.

Many customers might think that librarianship is the one profession that never changes (since all you do at work is read all day long—urghh!), but the truth of the matter is that technological advances and the economic downturn have done as much to change libraries as Gutenberg did to change publishing. The trick is finding ways to expand and enhance public services by embracing what the book calls “a more user-centric philosophy.”

“Today,” Zabel writes, “it’s not unusual for librarians to also serve as trend trackers, data analysts, project managers, IT troubleshooters, marketers, and staffing specialists.” Our customers, she adds, have new needs and expectations. The essays also address outreach initiatives, the migration from print to e-reference collections, staffing 21st century libraries, and more.

Library Journal says Reference Reborn is “essential for public service librarians—academic and public, both veterans and new to the profession—and for students or potential students in information science. Highly recommended.”

Building a Reading City: Midwest City

November is NaNoWriMo. No, that's not Robin Williams' catch phrase from "Mork and Mindy." Write it out in full and it's National Novel Writing Month, during which potential writers are encouraged to write a complete 50,000 short novel in 30 days. (Or maybe 50,000 words of a novel to be completed later.) Midwest City Library celebrates it every year with their "Come Write In" program so we thought we'd ask the staff at MC to let us know what they're reading in November. Their responses cover the waterfront from classics to steampunk. Take a look.

Jerod Gerfen is reading an anthology of short weird fiction edited by Ann and Jeff VanderMeer called, appropriately enough, *The Weird: A Compendium of Strange and Dark Stories*.


"As noted explicitly in the subtitle, this book is a collection of, well, strange and dark short stories. The type of tale found in this anthology is one that doesn't quite fit into the standard horror genre, but often proves to be psychologically unsettling all the same. If you are looking to get creeped out but are tired of the whole vampire, zombie and shapeshifter fare, this book is definitely worth your while."

Joshua Jordan is taking a peek at a children's book.



Robin Sagel is indulging in a little comfort reading.


"I'm currently reading *Within My Heart*, the third book in the Timber Ridge Reflections series by




Linda Temple takes us back to Tsarist Russia. "After 40 years, I'm re-reading *Anna Karenina*, by Leo Tolstoy and am finding it surprisingly enjoyable and readable—all 900 pages of it. Sometimes described as one of the best books of all time, it has been made into a movie with a November release date. This sweeping novel touches on human frailties, strengths, and foibles, as well as realistically depicting the times in which it is set. I highly recommend this great book."



Tracey Thompson challenges the MC Librarians to beat the novel she's reading, *Phoenix Rising: A Ministry of Peculiar Occurrences Novel* by Pip Ballantine & Tee Morris.

"It's a steampunk adventure in which daring deeds are afoot. Agent Eliza D. Braun, a ravishing daredevil with a penchant for dynamite, and Agent Wellington Thornhill Books, Esquire, a librarian with an encyclopedic mind, must save Britain from a dire fate. It is a fast paced tongue-in-cheek novel."


My 6,128 Favorite Books

Observations from Joe Queenan’s *One For the Books*

Humorist Joe Queenan can be pretty annoying. When he starts in on people he doesn’t like, he takes no prisoners, and the chip on his shoulder is often as big as a California redwood. Here are some brief excerpts from his latest book about books and reading, which as of this writing was on order for MLS.

“I started borrowing books from a roving Quaker City bookmobile when I was 7 years old. Things quickly got out of hand. I had no way of knowing it at the time, but what started out as a harmless juvenile pastime soon turned into a lifelong personality disorder.

“I absolutely refuse to read books that critics describe as ‘luminous’ or ‘incandescent.’ I never read books in which the hero



... roots for the New York Yankees. I once spent a year reading nothing but books I picked off the library shelves with my eyes closed. The results were not pretty.


“Winston Churchill supposedly read a book every day of his life, even while he was saving Western Civilization from the Nazis. This is quite an accomplishment, because by some accounts Winston Churchill spent all of World War II completely hampered.

“I think of “obsessive readers” as dissatisfied customers. If you have read 6,000 books in your lifetime, or even 600, it’s probably because at some level you find ‘reality’ a bit of a disappointment. No matter what they may tell themselves, book lovers do not read primarily to obtain information or to while away the time. They read to escape to a more exciting, more rewarding world. A world where they do not hate their jobs, their spouses, their governments, their lives.

“This is how I feel about my favorite writers. If you are an old man thinking of taking early retirement, read King Lear first. Take lots of notes, especially when the gratuitous blinding of senior citizens starts in.

“I do not speed-read books; it seems to defeat the whole purpose of the exercise. Unless paid, I never read books by or about businessmen or politicians; these books are interchangeably cretinous and they all sound exactly the same: inspiring, sincere, flatulent, deadly.

“People who need to possess the physical copy of a book, not merely an electronic version, believe that the objects themselves are sacred. Some people may find this attitude baffling, arguing that books are merely objects that take up space. This is true, but so are Prague and your kids and theistine Chapel. Think it through, bozos.”
