
Our pals in the Outreach Department share their current reading with us this month, when suspense and mystery seem to be on most minds. Take a look:


Outreach Director **Dana Morrow** can always be found reading the best in nonfiction. "I just finished David Mc-Cullough's *The Greater Journey: Americans in Paris*. This is the story of the intellectual legacy that France imprinted on its 19th-century visitors from America. They were overwhelmed by the great, awe-inspiring beauty of Paris and the education to be received there. McCullough tells us that any doctor hoping to be the best went to study there."

Kelley Riha is currently reading *The Diviners* by Libba Bray, which is the first book in what could become a series of YA thrillers. "It's set in the 1920s. There's a serial killer on the loose in Manhattan and it's up to thoroughly modern Evie and her crew to 'divine' who is responsible. Is your curiosity killing you? Read The Diviners; it just may scare you to death."

Opting for a gentler if no less tough style of mystery, **Anita Roesler** is reading Marcia Mueller's *Looking For Yesterday*, the latest in the long line of Sharon McCone mysteries. "Sharon once again takes on a seemingly impossible task to solve a cold case. It promises to be typical Mueller--very exciting and a fun read. I'm also reading *Call Me Mrs. Miracle* by Debbie Macomber--a fluffy Christmas story which I'm enjoying immensely!"

And **Emily Williams**, Young Adult Services Coordinator, is staying true to her YAishness by reading *Ashes* by Ilsa Bick, the first volume of a trilogy. "A dying girl goes hiking in the woods when a mysterious electro-magnetic pulse kills most of the adults and turns the kids into zombies."

Lending Library: Public Library Services For the Poor: Doing All We Can

It's the holiday season, that time of year when we're inundated with reminders that too many people have gotten a raw deal from nature and/or their fellow men, and need all the help we can give them. But maybe as library staff we see the results of these tough deals all the time when we work with the jobless and working poor on a daily basis.

Instead of simply tolerating this population, we have the chance to empower these individuals and form connections that will make the library an essential part of their lives. This book, by authors who have worked over 30 years at the St. Louis Public Library, will provide inspiration as well as practical tools and suggestions for librarians or administrators who want to do all they can to provide services to the poor.

It's divided into three parts—"Think and Plan," "Act," and "Big Challenges"—and covers such topics as understanding professional attitudes about poverty, overcoming barriers that keep the poor from using the library, developing programs and services from which the poor can benefit, and collaborating with other agencies. Special concerns such as homelessness are also addressed. Now that the holidays are drawing to a close, don't forget that there are things we can do to help even those who don't know how to ask for it.
