On the Safe Side

Have you heard about the announcement from Director of Human Resources **Lori Piccolo** regarding the new approach to MLS Safety Training?

We still need to complete Safety Training on a quarterly basis, same as always. That's a rule put in place by the Oklahoma Department of Labor, Public Employees Occupation Safety and Health (PEOSH) Division. It's nice to know that someone is looking out for us, sort of like a big brother.

But a nice change has been put in place to help us with the kind of training we need. Here's Lori:

"I have some great news! The days of searching for topics and tracking your time are over! Starting this quarter, employees will complete all safety training by utilizing the library's LMS system. At the beginning of each quarter, you will receive an e-mail notifying you of the required course that is to be completed.

"The training requirements for this quarter will be Tornado Safety & Emergency/Disaster Preparedness. In the next few weeks, you will receive an email notifying you when the course is available and ready for you to complete.

Training is still due two weeks before the end of each quarter. The quarterly topics will be:

- 1st Quarter: Hazard Communications
- 2nd Quarter: Tornado Safety and Emergency/Disaster Preparedness
- 3rd Quarter: Bloodborne Pathogens
- 4th Quarter: Fire Safety and other topics as determined necessary by Human Resources and/or the MLS Safety Committee

Building a Reading City:


SF and Fantasy Rule the Day

This month let's take a stroll around the system to see who's reading what. When our staff is exploring speculative fiction and fantasy, you never know what you'll find.



Kim will be beaming west again this summer for Comic-Con in San Diego so it's really no surprise that she's reading the first volume in the Magic Ex Libris series, *Libriomancer* by Jim C. Hines. Libriomancers are magicians who can pull things and people out of books, but in the premiere volume vampires have begun leaking out on their own. Bad news. The book has been called "geek porn for the urban fantasy set," which in this case is a good thing.

Sally McCurry, DC. Sally is a new reviewer for *info*, and we're glad to welcome her onboard. She writes: "I always have 4-5 books going at once and right now is no different. I'm reading *Pinterist for Dummies*, but it hasn't helped with my biggest problem, which is my inability to stay on topic and not wander. The book has helped me organize my interests and shown me how to use it as a library tool. I'm also reading *Cold Plague* by Daniel Kalla, a 2008 medical mystery about a pandemic started by









mad cow disease and spread through prions. It is well-written (more so than Crichton's books). Next to my bed is *Inside of a Dog* by Alexandra Horowitz, which is giving me some insight into my Chihuahua's ongoing feud with my cat. I've almost finished *Orleans* by Sherri L. Smith, a young adult dystopian novel. It's the best kind of sc-fi; it takes the plausible what-if of how the U.S. would handle the Gulf area if the hurricane and storm surge losses are ongoing and increasingly destructive.

Emily Williams, OUT. Emily is preparing for Summer at the Library with a twisted version of an old fantasy favorite. The book is Cinder by Marissa Meyer, a fractured fairy tale take which has been described this way: "Singing mice and glass slippers are replaced with snarky androids and mechanical feet in this darkly subversive retelling of 'Cinderella." Set in the city of New Beijing China, 123 years after World War IV, this imaginative YA phantasmagoria is the first volume in The Lunar Chronicles, the next volume of which, Scarlet, introduces Cinder to an updated Red Riding Hood. Check it out.

George Washington, John Adams, and Thomas Jefferson were all great readers but their tastes in books added nothing to the book collection at the White House. Why? Because there wasn't one.

Not a permanent collection, that is. Yes, the early presidents had books at hand when they had time to read, but the books they had were the ones they owned themselves, and when they left the White House for non-governmental retirement at Mt. Vernon, Peacefield and Monticello, they took their books with them. (Note to purists: we know that Washington didn't live in the White House. Adams was the first to enjoy that honor.)

So who was the first president to realize that the establishment of a permanent White House Library would be a good thing? The forgotten man of the pre-Civil War presidency, Millard Fillmore, with the help of his wife, Abigail.

This catalogue of the library that they assembled not only reveals much about their own preoccupations and interests and those of the age they lived in, but also provides insight into American library history, reading history, and book trade and distribution networks.


