"We had a regular member come in one day really agitated. She had five books that her new puppy had chewed up. Ironically, the books were on puppy training. She knew that she was responsible for them. She also knew that there was no way she could pay for them all at once- they totaled over \$120.00. She was panicked because she did not want to lose her borrowing privileges. All five books had been checked out twice - so she was also at her limit.

I suggested that she let me check them in and then immediately check them back out to her account. With the items still under her number, we knew where they were, and we could make note of this on her account. I arranged for her to come in once a month and pay for one book at a time. Each time she came in to pay for an item, I placed the item as lost and then went to the POS and had her pay for it. We continued this process until she was able to pay off all her books. I always made notes in her account and made sure that we had an accurate account of what she had paid for and what she had left.

A scenario like this would be even easier to accomplish now with our new lending guidelines."

Little Hands Art Camp Experimenting with Texture



Oklahoma City children had the opportunity to take part in a homegrown art project with a styling they could relate to – one in the artistic style of children's illustrator Eric Carle.

Belle Isle children's librarian Katherine Hickey, together with local artist Heather White, created a unique summer art program to encourage children to take ownership of their local library. In the collaborative project, children painted pieces of paper with different textures, and White cut out shapes to form them into the Oklahoma landscape.

"This project allowed families to spend quality time together, and created a unique experience they can remember each time they walk into the children's area and see the mural," Hickey said.

World famous illustrator Eric Carle of "Brown Bear, Brown Bear What Do You See?" among other titles, is known for his unique artistic style. He creates texture with paint on tissue paper, cuts out the shapes, and stores the shapes in color-coded drawers before assembling his well-known pieces of art.

White and Hickey created a list of Oklahoma plants and animals, and assigned each family a piece of the mural. The families used a "texture cart" with things like bubble wrap, balls of scrunched paper, plastic utensils, various paint brushes, and cotton balls to create their unique designs.

We challenged each family to create the texture of their plant or animal, White said. For the hawk design the family used forks to create the lines of the feathers, for the turtle they mixed salt with their paints to create a rough bumpy texture, and for the horse they used their hand-prints to create spots, White said.

Children ranging in age from three years to ten participated in the program. Over twenty-five children participated in the art project. Following the installation of the mural, Hickey and White hosted an Eric Carle story time, and sang songs with the children.

The Little Hands Art Camp started with a member and her interaction

with her local children's librarian. White walks to the library regularly with her two-year-old, and asked Hickey to suggest some art related storybooks. The relationship resulted in a regular art program for children at the Belle Isle Library.

"The Eric Carle mural [it] encouraged members to view the building as "their library," thereby strengthening their commitment to it," Hickey said.

White teaches pre-k through 2nd graders art at a local school and works for the Oklahoma Museum of Art. She started a program at the museum called Babies at the Museum aimed at children two years old and under to get them experiencing the art in a fun child-friendly way.

White will continue to teach the Little Hands Art Camp at Belle Isle each month this fall.
