Characteristics of Psychological Suspense

- 1. **PACING** The pacing is more measured and the physical action less intense than in Suspense novels. These are often densely written novels with more description than dialogue.
- 2. **STORY LINE** Elaborately constructed plots are the hallmark of these stories, which are characterized by frequent twists (both mental and plot), surprises, and layers of meaning. Endings may be unresolved.
- 3. **CHARACTERIZATION** Protagonists are often misfits, who may or may not be sympathetic characters. Readers observe the characters rather than participate in their predicaments.
- 4. **FRAME/SETTING** The interior workings of the mind—even madness—frame these stories, and leave readers on edge, straddling the line between sanity and unreason.
- 5. **TONE/MOOD** These books create a world of mental nightmares, and that chilling, disturbing tone drives the stories and keeps the readers off balance.
- 6. **STYLE/LANGUAGE** Writing style is important in creating this disturbing mood, and these novels are often elegantly written.
